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# Westmorland Greenspace Update

It's been a long time coming but spring seems to have finally arrived. In April, a small group of volunteers began the pruning of the 'shrub islands' just east of the Rock Garden at the Park. We had expected to do that in March but there was too much snow cover. We'll continue to thin these areas of the overgrown shrubs and remove those things that shouldn't be there. Some of the shrubs will re-sprout and we will gradually add some native low-maintenance shrubs to these islands.

On a lovely April 19<sup>th</sup>, a band of enthusiastic volunteers joined us for our annual **Earth Day Cleanup at Westmorland Park**. We were actually outnumbered by people from outside of Westmorland who found out about our project via the Parks Department. As a result, we finished mulching the flowering trees and some of the shrub islands east of the Rock Garden in less than an hour. These mulch perimeters help protect the trees from mowing equipment and keep weeds down in the shrub islands. With all those willing volunteer hands available, we were able to get help with pruning, raking, trash pickup

and hauling brush to the curb. A **big Thank You to all those neighbors who helped.**

You may have noticed the large piles of brush we produced that day on the terraces along Gately Terrace. This is an opportune time to remind people, at the request of the Parks Department, **NOT** to put your yard waste or brush on the Park terrace. The City Streets crews do not pick up the brush at the Park. That is handled by the Parks Department primarily upon our request. Please keep your brush and yard waste on your own terrace for the City Streets crew. You can find their pickup schedule on the city website.

After a late start, then dry conditions and wet conditions and high winds, we managed to burn the Odana prairie just before Earth Day. Last year's growing season produced excellent fuel and we had a very successful burn. These hotter burns will be better at achieving our goal of setting back non-native plants as well as releasing seeds and nitrogen for the next growing season and blackening the area for good solar warmth. We hope to complete the Tokay prairie at the Park as well as the Glenway Ravine before the end of April.

Our regular Tuesday night work parties have begun. We meet at 6:30 and work until about 8pm at various locations throughout Westmorland, usually followed by refreshments at the Village Bar. If you'd like to receive notice of where we'll be and what we'll be doing, please let me know and I will add you to our email list.

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
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# WESTMORLAND HISTORY COMMITTEE

## Original Land Survey of the Westmorland Neighborhood

The Northwest Ordinance of 1787 prescribed land transfers through treaties with Indian tribes in the territory and included provisions for the surveying and selling of United States public lands taken from the Indians by the treaties. The U.S. General Office was finally established in 1812 to carry out these responsibilities.

Under the supervision of a Surveyor General, teams of surveyors transversed the land, dividing it into six mile squares called towns, and subdividing the towns into thirty six one mile square sections of 640 acres each. The surveyors transcribed their survey field notes into small notebooks which included information on (1) the quality of the land, (2) the agricultural value of the land on a scale of one to four, (3) the nature of the vegetation and the topography including swamps, rapids, and bluffs, and (4) signs of human habitation such as trails, Indian villages, mines, and cultivated fields.


The survey of Wisconsin occurred between 1832 and 1866. Wisconsin surveyor's notebooks were transcribed into maps, called survey plats, for every town section.

One copy of each map was sent to Washington D.C., one copy was kept at the Surveyor General's regional office in St. Louis or Dubuque, and one copy was sent to the first Wisconsin land offices established in 1834 in Mineral Point and Green Bay. Eventually, fourteen local land offices served Wisconsin.

After the close of the Blackhawk War in 1832, the U.S. Commissioner of Public Lands began a survey of the Madison area in December of 1834. Deputy Surveyor Orson Lyon and his survey crew performed a survey of the Westmorland area from December 11 to 13, 1834. A copy of their survey field notes is available at the U.W. The surveyor's notes describe the topography of Westmorland as "hilly or rolling and 2nd rate", the timber as "burr, black, and white oak", and the undergrowth as




Pages from the Federal surveyors field note book for the surveying of the Westmorland area, December 1834

“oak with grass” (similar to what can currently be seen in the U.W. Arboretum’s Curtis Prairie area). Mention was also made of an Indian trail leading northwest and southeast crossing near Westmorland Blvd., between Sections 20 and 21, in the vicinity of the current south entrance to Hoyt Park in the Sunset Village neighborhood. This trail led to a major Indian trail, roughly following where University Avenue now runs, that was used as Chief Blackhawk’s 1832 retreat route through the area that is now the westside of Madison.

Upon the completion of the U.S. government survey of the Madison area, land was offered for sale for the price of \$1.25 per acre for a minimum purchase of 40 acres beginning on August 1, 1835.

The three original owners of property in the Westmorland area as of June 20, 1837 included Alanson Sweet who purchased 80 acres (bounded by current Mineral Point Road, Glenway Street, Tokay Blvd. and Westmorland Blvd.), John P. Hilton who purchased 320 acres including a portion of Westmorland and the current Midvale Heights neighborhood (bounded by Mineral Point Road, Westmorland Blvd., Tokay Blvd., and Hilton Drive in Midvale Heights), and Phineas W. Leland who also purchased 320 acres including portions of what became Westmorland, Midvale Heights, Nakoma, and the Odana Golf Course (bounded by Tokay Blvd, a line through Westmorland Blvd. extended to the vicinity of the present Thoreau School, and a line extending west crossing Midvale Blvd. at the Southwest Commuter Path through Odana Golf Course to Hilton Drive).



## Notes... from the History Committee

The History Committee continues to develop the “Voices of Westmorland” book: a collection of oral history interviews of long-time Westmorland residents conducted during 2013. A book launch event for the book will be planned for September 2014 at the Sequoya Branch Library.

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# Going Green In Westmorland

## Green Tracking

Cutting down on greenhouse gas emissions, using less water, and cutting our costs are noble causes, but how do we know how we are doing? Is there a way to track our energy and water use, and monitor our energy expenditures?

The short answer is yes; there are ways to monitor gas, electricity, and water utilization and compare usage from month to month and prior years. MG&E's website gives you data on your own consumption: [https://www.mge.com/my\\_mge/overview.htm](https://www.mge.com/my_mge/overview.htm)

To get an idea of whether your increased use of natural gas this year is related only to the colder winter, this site allows you to compare natural gas use (measured in therms) to heating degree days, a measure of how cold it was during the billing period (therms/heating degree-days). If your natural gas use in therms/heating degree-days is the same as a similar month in prior years, it suggests the increase usage is related to the cold, and not a lack of conservation. You can compare your usage to a home of a similar size. You'll also find good tips on energy conservation.

Currently, water use is tabulated every six months, coinciding with your bill. If you view the water usage tab, you can see a graph of your water usage over many years. Our usage has decreased as children left home, and as we became more conscious of water usage. The increase in water use over summer months, if you water your lawn, will be painfully obvious—as ours was last year with a newly seeded lawn.

With the new water meters, which most of us have had installed, water usage readings will be more frequent. As the Madison Water Utility website states, "As Project H<sub>2</sub>O winds down, Madison Water Utility ... is already alerting customers to major residential leaks as early as three days after usage begins to spike. By mid-2014, customers will be able to track their own daily—or even hourly—usage online through MWU's website..."

I am not sure I want to know my hourly water usage, but I can determine how much water a bath takes (a lot), and compare with a shower (less). On the other hand, you may not want to know how much water your teenager uses, with their seemingly unending showers, unless you can influence their behavior.

Everyone responds differently to this kind of information, but most people find it helpful to track. Maybe you will too.

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# County Board Update

Happy Spring! I'm honored to have been re-elected to my 5th term on the county board. And I'm excited to report that I have been re-elected by my peers to serve as Vice Chair of the Dane County Board. Please let me know what you think our priorities should be.

Meanwhile, my responses to the League of Women Voters were erroneously left out of the printed paper. You can imagine how frustrated I was to not see my answers in the paper! I bet you were too. So here they are below! They are also available on the LWV website.

## 1. What educational, occupational, civic, and community experiences have you had that you believe qualify you for this elective office?

I'm honored to be Vice Chair of the county board. In 8 years, I've expanded mental health services and



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programs for low-income families and seniors; protected our environment and reduced our carbon footprint; supported unions and workers; and fought for criminal justice.

My top priorities include supporting public schools and struggling families, and addressing racial disparities / increasing alternatives to incarceration in our criminal justice system.

I also help elect progressive women in Madison, Wisconsin and nationally, as a board member of Emerge Wisconsin and Emerge America. I'm on the Van Hise PTO and the NARAL Pro-Choice Wisconsin Foundation board.

## 2. What is the most significant environmental issue facing Dane County and what do you think the County Board should do about it?

The top environmental priority is protecting our lakes. As annual rainfall amounts increase, so too increases lake runoff. This is a countywide problem: from rural manure and agricultural waste to impervious surfaces in cities. We can reduce agricultural runoff with manure digesters that collect runoff and turn it into energy (while creating green technology jobs). We can address city development through smarter growth and preserving our watersheds and green spaces.

We also must increase mass transit, prioritizing bus service across the county.

Finally, our 911 and emergency teams must prepare for more frequent weather extremes, including ice storms, flooding, and blizzards.

## 3. What are the two most important steps the Dane County Board can take to address the concerns of homelessness?

We must increase services for homeless families and families on the brink of homelessness. First, we desperately need more affordable housing. I'm proud to have authored several initiatives to develop affordable housing and cooperative housing in Dane County. We must collaborate with, and support financially, our community partners addressing youth and family homelessness—MMSD, YWCA, United Way.

Second, we must support living wage jobs, increased mass transit, and easier access to services, to prevent struggling families from falling into homelessness.

And always, we must treat homeless families and people with dignity. They are members of our community, from our community.

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


